

Can we record intimacy without spoiling it? What is the fate of the ongoing metropolization of urban dwelling? How can it be narrated? These questions guided us in the making of our documentary **The Order I live In. An indoor urban**

symphony, between Madrid, México and Montevideo (with Jorge Moreno Andrés, 2018). Departing from a number of collective exploration workshops in the three cities, it essays a transurban, narrative and sensorial approach to contemporary living. Twenty dwellers introduce us to the spaces they live in, the stuff they love, the trifles that insufflate affect to them. The resulting account counterpoints the classical urban symphonies -with their esthetics of crowd, machines and rush in public places. The emerging collective voice rather dives on what George Perec called "the infraordinary": little events, background noises, mysteries and allures of the everyday. It is only through singular, concrete micro-stories of the Self that we get a glimpse at the whole existence of those doing the telling. The film invites to address questions around the fate of "intimacy", the role of narratively and the promises and limits of ethnographic collaboration.
